## High court overturns ex-judge's order

Benjamin Veling will be back in Oakland Circuit Court next month to learn whether he will be sentenced as a juvenile or adult for shotgunning a Wixom neighbor.

Ziem of Walled Lake, won a 7 to 0
Michigan Supreme Court decision Tuesday ordering still another hearing in the three-year-oldese.

"It is interesting to note that defendant (Veling) does not contest the validity of his conviction," said a Supreme Court footnote, "but only the court footnote, "but only the court's authority to sentence him."

The issue — which lawyers call a "case of first impression" — revolves around a confusing 1986 change in state law giving prosecutors more authority to charge 15- and 16-year-olds as adults. Veling was 15- at the time of the shooting in September of 1990. Now 18, he has been free on bond.
Oakland prosecutor Richard Thompson wants Veling sentenced as an adult before Circuit Judge Denise Langford-Morris, who could send him to a juvenile facility until he turns 21.

The Legislature changed the law to allow prosecution of youngsters as adults where they are charged with such major crimes as assault with intent to commit murder, for example.

"(T)he circuit judge's remand order to the probate court for disposition should be weated, and the judge ordered to conduct hearing' to determine whether Veiling and the public are best served by a probate or circuit court sentencing, wrote Justice James H. Brickley.

"In vacating this order, we note that the Oakland County circuit judge had no authority to remand this case to the probate court without conducting the post-court without conducting the post-courtiellor sentencing hearing, unless that hearing was waived by the prosecutor and the defendant," Brickley added in a footnote.

## Prosecutor revises stats for county burglaries

Like a thief in the night, the incidence of home and commercial burglaries in Oakland County went from a 3 percent increase after some investigation

a 14 percent decrease after some investigation.

The Professional Independent Insurance Agents of Michigan recently reported that burglaries declined statewide from 1991 to 1992, but rose 3 percent in Oakland County.

However, Oakland County pro-secutor Richard Thompson re-ports that PIIAM's statistics are misleading because Pontiac didn't report burglaries to the state police for 1989, 1990 and 1991, but did report them for 1992.

PilAM's figures, which come from the state police, say there were 8,193 burglaries reported in Oakland County in 1992 (including Pontiac), up from 7,955 in 1991 (not including Pontiac).

If you subtract Pontiac's 1,375 reported burglaries from the 1992 total, there are 6,618 burglaries. That would be a 14 percent decrease in Oakland County burglaries from 1991 to 1992.

A better comparison, Thompson said, would be 1988 and 1992 because Pontiac reported in each of these years. With 11,894 burglaries reported in 1988 and 6,193 in 1992, there was a 31 percent drop.
