Water fight

Hearings deal with regionalizing system

Detroit businessman Anthony Soave may agree to testify next week at a public hearing on a proposal to regionalize the Detroit Water and Sewer Department, according to Sen. David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield.
 "I haven't talked with him (Soave) directly," said Honigman, who earlier this week said his committee is considering trying to subpoena Soave, who holds the DWSD sewer contract. "But intermediaries have told me he'd appear voluntarily."
 A chief Soave spokesman, however, said Soave has not agreed to anything. "I just talked with Tony a few minutes ago," said James A. Sharp, a vice president of City Management, one of Soave's main business ventures. "That's news to me."
 "We've repeatedly tried to contact Sen. Honigman. But neither he nor his staff will return phone calls," said Sharp.
 A spokesman for Detroit Mayor Coleman A. Young, in the meantime, questioned the authority and motive of Honigman and his committee. "It doesn't have subpoena power," said press secretary Bob Berg. "Furthermore,

Honigman is politically grand-standing."
 The question of Soave's appearing at a hearing came up Monday, as the state Senate's Local Government and Urban Development Committee conducted the second of a series of hearings it is holding on Bill 85 at the Oakland County Board of Commissioners Auditorium in Pontiac. Honigman is chairman of that committee and the only member to appear at the day-long hearing.

S.B. 85 was introduced by Honigman earlier this year. Like a similar bill he introduced last year, it would take control of DWSD away from the mayor of Detroit and place it in the hands of a regional authority made up of representatives of communities in the 15-county area served by DWSD.
 At Monday's hearing, Bill 85 received support from several communities including Rochester Hills, Bloomfield Township, West Bloomfield Township and Genesee County. It is also endorsed by Oakland County Drain Commissioner George Kubin.
 Those appearing complained of overcharges, inefficiency and unresponsiveness on the part of DWSD.

One witness, Russ Bellant a DWSD plant operator, said to his knowledge the Detroit water and sewer system is run efficiently according to normal business procedures.
 But Bellant's comments were more than overshadowed by the allegations of DWSD chemist Saul Simolunas who said Soave and others received no-bid contracts because of their connections with Detroit Mayor Coleman A. Young.

During a break in the hearing, Honigman said that in light of allegations from Simolunas, he would likely consider subpoenaing Soave along with some of his business records.
 Honigman Wednesday, however, said a subpoena might not be necessary. "As I understand it, he

(Soave) has agreed to testify under oath. But we (the committee) may still subpoena company records."
 The authority of his committee — or any other Senate committee — to subpoena witnesses or records was challenged Tuesday in Ingham Circuit Court, said Honigman.
 The suit contends Senate or House committees do not have subpoena power unless it is conferred by both houses of the Legislature, Honigman said.
 "I think committees do have subpoena power," he said. "But the matter is in litigation."
 Honigman's committee is scheduled to hold its third hearing on the proposed regional water and sewer authority at 9:30 a.m. Thursday in the Oakland County auditorium.
