Bud Light, Marauders in league final

A rematch will take place in the Division 1 playoff championship of the Great Lakes Men's Soccer League Cup.

Defending Cup champ Bud Light (9-4) of Flint will take on the regular-season champion Redford Marauders (11-2) for the title, 4 p.m. Sunday at Livonia's Bicentennial Park.

Bud Light, behind a pair of goals from Jeff Dresser, eliminated Paragon, 6-1 in Sunday's semifinals at Bicentennial Park. Detroit Rooker Doug Landefeld, Jack Vogel, Peter Crowley and Doug Consiginy also scored for Bud Light, which cruised to victory after opening up a 4-0 advantage.

Former Redford Catholic Central High player Joe Nora notched the lone goal for Paragon. In Sunday's other semifinal, the regular-season champ Marauders ousted the Birmingham Cobras, 5-0, as goalie Brian O'Shea posted the shutout.

Michigan State University captain Steve McCaul (Redford CC) scored along with Eastern Michigan's Paul Kaliszewski (Livonia Churchill) and Rob Ludwig.

Steve Weiger (Dearborn Edsel Ford/Buick) and Rooker Larry Richters (Livonia) Stevenson/Yale) also added goals for the Marauders, who led 2-0 at intermission.

In the opening round of the playoffs, the Marauders advanced with a wild 7-3 overtime win over A.S. Lazio Friday at Bicentennial; Paragon upset the African Stars 3-1 Thursday at Bicentennial; Bud Light upended Venom 6-2 Wednesday at Michigan State in East Lansing; and the Cobras blanked the Blazers 2-0 July 25.

Paragon toppled the Stars, who finished second in the regular season, with goals by Jeff Vandenberg (Schoolcraft), Bobby Paul and Rudy Redmond. Stah Wipley netted the Stars' only goal.

The other Division finals also set for Sunday at Bicentennial: Michigan Arsenal and Loyola will meet for the Division II crown Sunday at 2 p.m.
