A new main library could offer more to its patrons, Papai said.

Space would increase from 38,000 to 80,000 equare feet.

The book collection would increase to 300,000 from 125,000 volumes. Public seating would number 500 seats rather than 173 seats, and 325 cors rather than 213 cars would find parking spaces. Short-term and long-term parking would be available.

There may even be a drive-in window similar to the fone at the Rochester Hills Library, Papai said.

"This will be the last (new) library built," Papal said, "Eighty-five percent of Farmington Hills is developed."

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
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
