■ Arnold Campbell, 42, mayor pro-tem and Farmington City Council member for the past two years. He was elected and served a four-year term from 1985-89, but was unsuccessful in his re-election bid. He rebounded to win a two-year term in 1991. Campbell's been a Farmington resident for 15 years and is a product program analyst for Ford Motor Co.

■ Richard Tupper, 60, a longtime council member who served as mayor 1977-79 and 1987-89. Tupper was first elected to council in 1971 and served until 1982 when he resigned due to out-of-state business commitments. He was elected again in 1985 and in 1989. He is the owner of Tupper Associates and has been a resident of Farmington for 37 years.

Lyczkowiak has served on the Historical Commission for three years. He was one of the more outspoken critics of the downtown clock tower proposal earlier this year, putting up a mock time piece up in his front yard as a sign of protest.

"That's over and done with... it's time to move on," he said.

Lyczkowiak, who is the youngest candidate, calls for change. He's encouraged by the opening of the Grand Cafe and the proposed tea room downtown.

Lyczkowiak said he can bring some fresh ideas to council.

"It's going to be an interesting election," Lyczkowiak said. "We'll see how it goes."

Memorials may be made to the First Presbyterian Church of Farmington or Hospice of Southeastern Michigan.

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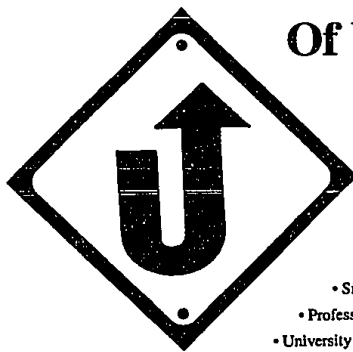
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
