Proving the old adage that things can indeed some full circle, Ed Kelly considers himself at

ome. A Windsor, Ont., native, Kelly has bounced ound Canada and the United States, leading o around Canada and the United States, reading a charmed radio life. Armed with an arsenal of voic es few can match and the ability to write airwave friendly comedy, Kelly now finds himself teamod with Ken Calvert for the morning shift at WLLZ-FM in Farmington Hills.

Given where he has ended up, it is ironic that the place where Kelly got his first radio break was also a place known as "Wheels" — a Windsor roller rink. Kelly had been working there as a disc jockey when CkWW, a small 500-watt station in town, happened to be doing a live remote broadcast. The program director spotted him and asked Jim if he was interested in working at the station.

Initially, the self-proclaimed "blue collar kid" chickened out at the opportunity, preferring a job at a local General Motors trim plant. But about a re-year later, he ran into the program director again — and this time decided to give it a go. His first "hilf, on a weekend at three in the morning, was not particularly memorable.

"It was like me and my Mom listening," Kelly said.

Continually passed over when more appealing shifts opened up, Kelly ended up doing the over-night show for three years. He then made a jump not normally made in radio— a job in Sarnie doing a morning show. There was no looking back. After bouncing around some Canadhan markets during the mid-89a. Kelly was hired as a writer and performer by the American Comedy Network in New York Cily in 1983. ACN is the preeminent supplier of pre-produced radio comedy bits, parody songs and celebrity impressions in the country, feeding material to morning shows in more than 300 markets.

Thanks in part to fax mechines, digital audio tape and overnight delivery services, Kelly is still employed by ACN as a principle performer, in addition to his current position at WLLZ. Therefore, morning commuters in cities all over the United States have the opportunity to enjoy Kelly's stalwart impressions of Eddie Murphy, Tom Brokaw, Regis Philbin, David Lee Roth and others.
