"They were determined reboun-ders and that is an essential part of our physical league, keeping people off the boards." The other post players are jun-iors Felicic. Brooks (5-10), Mitti Ruddock (5-9), and Holly Taylor (5-10), Brooks and Ruddock are returning varsity players.

"One of our strengths will be our depth in the post," Baker said. "All have the size to play in-side and are aggressive players. Felicia has the edge in rebound-ing and defense, and Mitzi has been scoring real well in the scrimmages.

We'll be able to run a number of players on to the court and play an aggressive, up-tompo game. For the re-turning players, the key is getting off to a strong start and es-tablishing some con-
