"We're going to be a young team, mostly juntors," coach Luke Juncaj said, adding Farmington has only three seniors. "We still have some talented kids, and some of the JV players have improved a lot. "The team does look pretty good, and I think we'll be competitive again. We do need work on defense, but the most important thing right now for these guys is to play together."
