Furniture, including some used by Thomas Edison, from the Henry Ford Estate in Dearborn has been returned to the estate af-ter spending the past 40 years at the Botsford Inn in Farmington Hills.

The estate bought several pieces from the John N. Anhut family, the owners of the Botsford fan, using proceeds from the 1993 Henry Ford Estate Dinner Dance, an annual fund-raising event for the benefit of the preservation restoration and educational programs of the estate, on the campus of the University of Michigan-Dearborn.

"We are eager to see these pieces returned to this National His-
