nality." "Isn't It Romantic" abounds with people who have more than a little originality. Thanks to costume designer Edith Leavis Bookstein's wy sense of Janie's anti-fashion style, Janie's outfits deliver laughs of their own.

hats, ruffled little girl anklets
worn with flats, high top red tennis shoes, and her writing outfit
earmuffs and mittens with
holes for her typing index fingers,
accentuate Janie's whimsical humor.

The play begins with the bane of modern life — the answering machine. Janiel latens to message so nhe rmachine and wists her expressive face into half a dozen hilarious grimaces before she says a single word. Marilyn Mays as frumpy Janie combines the child-like teddy bear hugging vulnerability of a person who heart unpacked boxes in her living room three months after she moved in, with the integrity of a grown woman willing to make hard choices like should she marry nice Dr. Silver, learn to cook a chicken, and move to Brooklyn.


