Livonia Clarenceville's Trojan horse was riding high Saturday. A big-play capability proved to be the difference Saturday as it rode into Lutheran High Westnote into Lutheran High West-land and galloped away with a 26-8 Metro Conference West Divi-sion football win.

Senior quarterback Luvic Lucal completed 10 of 19 passes for 172 yards and three touchdowns.

His favorite target, senior split end Mark Kalej, was on the reciving end of all three TD tosses. He finished the day with seven catches for 161 yards.
