"Some people will use a fire place only about five times a year for more romantic reasons while some will use their fire place as a heat source all winter," said Farmington fire prevention specialist Lt. Mike Garr of the Farmington processing the processing the processing the process of the proce ington Hills Fire Department. "Either way, the fire place should be cleaned and inspected."

Garr said a recent chimney fire at a residence on Nine Mile was

an example of a common problem:
the homeowner had forgotten to
open the flue. In that case the
house filled with smoke. But often, chimney fires start because of
creosate buildup in the chimney
or because the chimney is in poor
repair and the heat escapes and
starts a fire bohind a wall. In
those cases, the fire is often discovered by a neighbor, because
it's only visible from outside.

Some tips on preventing chim-ney fires include:

We use only the chimney and sto-vepipe specified in the installa-tion instructions for a wood burn-ing stove.

Be sure that the chimney is properly installed before it is enclosed in a wall or "chase."

If Keep the venting path short, with as few bends as possible.

Install chimney clean-outs to make soot and creesete removal case, especially for wood stoves.

If here your chimney cleaned each heating season before you use it.

"We do not make recommendations as to what company you hire to clean your chimney." Garr said.

"Just be a good consumer. Check around to see that the company does a good job."
