

Congress, FCC consider effects of new cable act

Congress is putting pressure on the FCC to re-visit the cable act. Meanwhile, cities are limited to applying to be certified to regulate the Broadcast Basic Tier (channels 2-23 on our cable system) through our franchising authority — the Southwestern Oakland Cable Commission. The FCC however, determines the appropriateness of the rates each cable company has determined to charge.

The upshot to this regulating change is to look at what we have developed as a result of our contract with MetroVision. This is important to understand because there are few communities which can boast of such real involvement. The cable company staff and management have always attended all our community television service planning meetings.
