OCC chief says no thanks to pay raise

Oakland Community College Chancellor Patey Fulton has asked her board of trustees "not" to give her a raise this year.

Fulton, whose annual salary is almost \$120,000, would likely have received a pay increase of 3-4 percent had she wanted one, said college spokesman George Cartsonis.

The trustees, Cartsonis sald, "were all very impressed with Fulton's initiative in this regard, and many of them thought she was really operating against her own best interest."

Instead, the board granted Fulton an additional five vacation days. "But knowing Patsy she

probably won't take them," said Dave Hackett, chairman of the board.
Fulton said she doesn't feel right taking a pay raise when revenues are down and the college is tightening its financial belt.
"We seriously had a downturn in resources," she said. "That's not only true for us, it's true-across the state. I think it's terribly important that, I be responsive to that."

Turning down a pay increase, she added, is certainly "a symbolic measure, but it's not symbolic that our budget is really tight."

OCC history professor Ed Gallagher, a former OCC provost, was glad to hear of Fulton's decision. "She's practicing what she's preaching then," he said. "Good for her."

OCC teachers, Gallagher said, are more or less satisfied with Fulton's performance. "She's upbeat and optimistic, and I think we needed that."
Hackett called Fulton "a very high-principled person" and said "she's certainly entitled to everythings she gots and then some as fer as I'm concerned."
Said trustee Doug Wakefield: "I think (Fulton) is worth every penny of what she's getting and I wish we could give her more."
Now in her third year with OCC, Fulton accepted a 4-5-percent increase last year, but turned own a raise in 1991.
Among Fulton's contemporaries, Schoolerath College President Dick McDowell is paid \$39,000 as year after getting a 4.5-percent raise last July. Sandra Packard,



in her second year as president of Oakland University, gets \$132,000 a year. Her predecessor, Joe Champagne, was getting \$120,000 when he left in 1991.

Governor signs 'potty parity' bill

"Potty parity" will become Michigan law

Jan. 1.

Gov. John Engler signed Rep. Jan Dolan's bill to increase the number of women's toilet facilities in theaters, exhibition halls, libraries, sports arenas, recreation centers, passenger terminals, outdoor assemblies and larger restaurants.

"The need for more toilet facilities for wom-on is obvious to anyone who has seen the unacceptably long lines outside women's rest-rooms in buildings which host large crowds," said Engler of the bill that took eight years to become law.
"It recognizes that women, especialy those with children, need more toilet facilities, espe-

cially where large numbers of peole gather. Thankfully, the excruciatingly long liens for toilets at women's restrooms will be a thig of

tollets at women's the past."

Dolan, R-Farmington Hills, won legislative passage of House Bill 4120 to amend the State Construction Code to require a 3-2 ratio of women's to men's tollets.
