PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Farmington Hills City Council will give formal consideration to a proposed text amendment of the Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, which amendment will amend Section 34-3 as follows:

- Commercial Vehicle means all vehicles used for the transportation of passengers for hire, or constructed or used for transportation of goods, wares or merchandise and/or all motor vehicles designed and used for drawing other vehicles.

Vehicle means every device in, upon, or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a highway, excepting devices designed exclusively to be moved by human power.

#### PROPOSITION TO RESTORE MILLAGE

"Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be levied against all taxable property in Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan be increased by \$0.872 mill (\$9,972 per each one thousand dollars of state equalized valuation for 1993 to be used for general operating expenses of the School District? If approved, this millage would raise an estimated \$231,549 for the School District in 1993 and return the School District to millage rates previously authorized by the voters."

# Senior Power Day returns to area

A review of how President Clinton's health care reform plan will affect older adults is one of several features of the 11th annual Oakland County Senior Power Day, coming to the Southfield Civic Center Pavilion 10 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Monday, Oct. 18. A resource fair with more than 60 exhibits of interest to seniors opens at 9 a.m.

The keynote address will be delivered by consumer advocate Esther Shapiro, director of consumer affairs for the city of Detroit. Shapiro will show seniors how to maximize their power as voters and consumers.

The day also provides seniors the opportunity to ask questions of elected officials during a public hearing.

Elected officials who have committed to attend include state Rep. Maxine Berman, D-Southfield.

Other area legislators who will be attending include state Rep. John Jamian, R-Bloomfield Hills, state Sen. Michael Bouchard, R-Birmingham and U.S. Rep. Dale Kildee, D-Flint.

"Oakland County Senior Power Day is planned by seniors for seniors," said 1993 chairman Harry

Shiovitz of Southfield. "For more than a decade, the day has brought together older adults in Oakland County to show them how to flex their political muscle and provide information to enhance their quality of life. We encourage all Oakland County seniors to join us on Oct. 18."

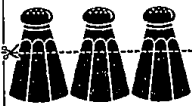
