THREE FIRES IN FIVE DAYS AT WALLED LAKE; COTTAGE IS DESTROYED

Following what seems a custom Walled Lake again has had its group of three fires, this time all coming in the space of five days.

On Christmas day the barn on the property occupied by Howard Shingler, was destroyed by fire, and Clyde Darrow who makes his home with him was burned on the hand. Two days later the home of Ira Carnes was threatened for a few moments when the roof caught fire, but luckily it was discovered and the blaze quickly extinguished by the use of chemicals.

On Thursday a cottage believed to belong to Ona Herndon of Detroit in the Idlewood Subdivision was destroyed by fire.

The fire at the Shingler residence was caused by the explosion of a gasoline lantern. The blaze spread quickly and the barn was soon destroyed. A horse and two calves were burned but two other horses and some cattle saved. Mr. Darrow suffered severe burns in attempting to push Mr. Shingler's car out of the barn.

The fire on Tuesday was caused when papers which were put in the furnace by Mrs. Carnes, were drawn up the chimney and alighted on the dry roof. The damage was about \$30.

Thursday's fire might have resulted seriously for the cottages in the Idlewood Subdivision, if a provident wind had not been blowing in the right direction. The cause of this fire is unknown.

Charles E. Coe and sons who were working on a garage near the cottage stated that a man and woman drove up to the cottage and, after telling Mr. Coe he had to get some papers, the man went inside. He was in about fifteen minutes, then came out and getting in the car, drove away, Mr. Coe said.

About five minutes later Mr. Coe noticed smoke coming from the house and rushing over they discovered it ablaze on the inside. Mr. Coe drove to the nearest telephone to summon the fire department but before the apparatus arrived the entire structure was a mass of flames.

A couple who were sitting in their car parked on Pontiac street were believed to be the same man and woman. They drove up about the time the alarm was given and persons returning from the fire reported having met them.

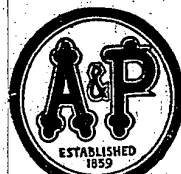
