That neither the City of Farmington nor the State can compel the installation of fire escapes on two-story buildings was the statement of State Fire Marshal Peter Karn, who visited the city during the past week and made an inspection. This ruling appears to have blocked the move to force the building of fire escapes on several buildings in the city.  
Mr. Karn stated, however, that fire escapes had been ordered on one three-story building in the city about a year ago, and that this was the only structure on which fire escapes could be required.

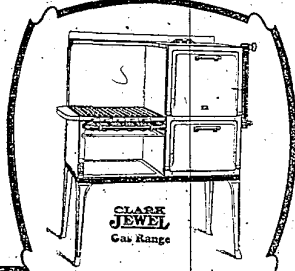
