adopted to enable the commission and citizens to determine the cost of each city job, and how much labor is expended upon each.

On recommendation of Mayor Butterfield, Commissioner Johnson and Superintendent George Grant, the Commission voted to use only first-class gravel on city streets henceforth, because "the cheaper gravel contains a large percentage of clay which washes away quickly." Crushed stone is also being considered.

Commissioners Staman and Bicking were appointed a committee to interview the Detroit Edison Company as to the possibility of obtaining additional streetlights on Shiawassee street, between Power and Warner avenues.

Appointment of three men to represent the city on the suggested commission of nine to determine the interests in the town hall, was delayed after discussion. It is anticipated that the city's representatives will be named within the near future, either by the Commission or Mayor Butterfield.
