DIED SUDDENLY

Frederick Sallow Passed Away Saturday Morning.

Frederick Sallow, an old and respected citizen of Farmington township, aged 65, died suddenly last Saturday morning. He did not arise usually in the morning and it was found that he was sick. Medical aid was secured as quickly as possible, but before the doctor arrived he had expired.

Mr. Sallow had lived in this part of the state for many years. There survives him to mourn their loss a wife and seven children.

The funeral services were held from the German church in Farmington Tuesday (at 12:00 o'clock) conducted by Rev. Stange and the remains were interred in the Clarenceville German Lutheran cemetery. Frank Zessau, funeral director of Farmington, had charge of the funeral.

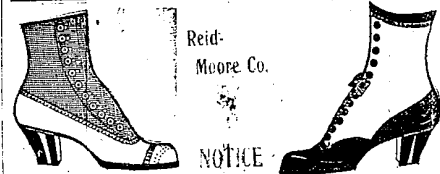
