

OAKLAND FACTORY WILL HOLD AN OPEN HOUSE CELEBRATION APR. 17, 18, 19

A three-day Open House Celebration has been arranged by the Oakland Motor Car Company at Pontiac, Mich., April 17, 18, 19, to mark the completion of the ultra-modern \$3,000,000 assembly and shipping buildings for the Oakland All-American Six.

During these three days the Oakland and Pontiac Six factories will operate until 10 p. m. in order that the public may see in action the mammoth new plants with their highly specialized equipment and the many thousands of craftsmen at the multitude of manufacturing operations which go to make up the finished car. Guides will be on hand from 7 p. m. until 10 p. m. to conduct the visitors through the plants. Every important factory operation will be labeled with a big explanatory placard.

In the immense new shipping building a 15-piece dance orchestra will play popular dance music from 8 p. m. until midnight. Concert numbers also will be rendered by the famous Oakland Motor Car Company band. Refreshments will be served near the dance floor.

FARMINGTON RESIDENTS VISIT MUSCLE SHOALS AMONG A PARTY OF 50

* The Misses Ida Steele and Ada Safford returned Saturday morning from Muscle Shoals, Ala. They were entertained in a party of 50 people, owners of land in the district.

"The center of interest lies in the Wilson Dam, which was built and is owned by the United States Government," Miss Steele says.

"The waste of energy there now is astounding—energy which could give light, heat and power to the whole country if needed. Congress has been slow in determining the policies for its use, but whether it continues under government control or private, it must soon become active. Already small factories have been built, and a rubber plant, and a furniture factory are being definitely planned. School buildings have been built and a hospital ready to be put to use.

"The nitrate plant, for which the dam was originally built, was carefully explained showing the process of extracting nitrogen from the air and so combining it with other materials that it may be available. This is one of the most important elements in fertilizer. Now the United States buys it from Chile.

"The special entertainment of the trip was the barbecue and dance at Pride plantation. The lovely old home was a picture long to be remembered, with its background of negro quarters—all set in a beautiful grove on the bluff above the Tennessee River, several miles up from the Wilson Dam.

"At Chattanooga delightful rides were taken to Lookout Mountains, Chickamauga Park and Missionary Ridge.

BEEKEEPERS CLUB HAS FIRST MEETING PLANS ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Word has recently come in from beekeepers within a ten-mile radius and one beekeeper from New York (resident here), sent word to have his name placed on the membership list.

The next meeting will be held Friday evening, April 13, at 8:00 o'clock at the North Farmington School. At this meeting questions will be answered and club officers will be elected. All are welcome, beekeepers or not.

GRAND TRUNK PLANNING TO IMPROVE RAILROAD DEPOT AT WALLED LAKE

Improvement of the Walled Lake Grand Trunk depot by the installation of electric lights and other work is promised for the near future. Thomas B. King, superintendent of the Grand Trunk Railway System, addressing the Walled Lake Exchange Club recently, told the members that placing of the new lights and painting of the buildings was planned for this Spring.

In explaining the present passenger service he told the club that the cost of operating a steam train was approximately 60 cents per mile, but the gasoline-electric train could be maintained for about 30 cents a mile. The passenger revenue brings the road about 14 cents per mile.

PLANS ACCEPTED FOR WIXOM'S COMMUNITY HALL

Building plans for the Wixom Community Hall were submitted by the committee at the special meeting of the league on Monday night and with a few minor exceptions were accepted.

The proposed building will be 79x36, and of cement block construction with a brick or tile front. A full basement will be built and the main floor will be constructed to accommodate basketball games, auditorium, etc., with a stage at one end.

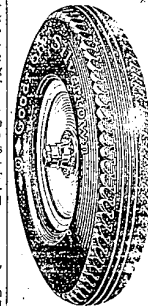
The road between Wixom and Milford is reported to have been blocked traffic a short distance out of Wixom.

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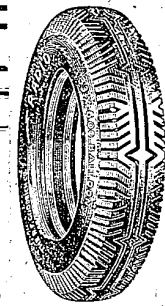

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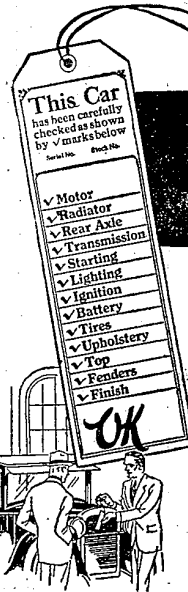
