INTEREST LACKING, CLINIC TO BE HELD BUT ONCE A MONTH

Few Parents Bring Children to Health Clinic; New Nurse Assumes Charge

Lack of interest on the part of mothers has resulted in a curtailment of the Oakland County Board of Health Free Baby Clinic program in Farmington. Heretofore there have been two clinics held each month, but due to small attendance, it has been decided to hold only one monthly.
 Miss G. Elliott, who has taken over the work formerly in charge of the clinic, states that despite the fact that the clinics are free, few mothers in Farmington take advantage of them. Miss Elliott emphasizes the fact that the clinics are held for the apparently healthy babies as well as unwell children, and that frequently illnesses are detected in babies considered perfectly healthy. Mothers are urged, especially in May, is the month during which health is most strongly emphasized, to bring their children to the clinics for examination. The clinics are to be held at the Farmington Methodist Church on the second Wednesday of each month, from 2:30 to 3:30 p. m. Tonsil clinics are held on the fourth Friday of each month at the Infirmary in Pontiac, for pre-school children.
