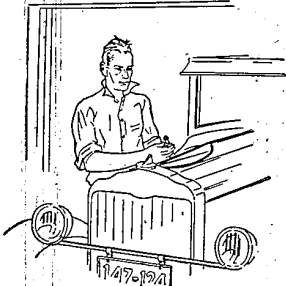

Mail boxes through the country have been given a fresh coat of paint by two traveling painters

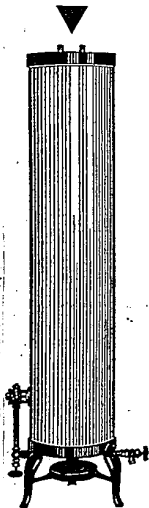
who have been busy in this community the past week.

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CLARENCE L. SMITH A CANDIDATE FOR COUNTY PROSECUTOR

Former Assistant Running For
Republican Nomination At
Primaries Sept. 4th



Clarence L. Smith, formerly assistant prosecuting attorney, has announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for prosecuting attorney at the primaries September 4.

Mr. Smith is a native of Oakland County and a son of former Supervisor Delbert J. Smith of South Lyon. He was born on a farm in Lyon Township, graduated from the South Lyon High School and subsequently attended the University of Michigan for six years, where he graduated from both the literary college and the law school. Upon graduation from the law school in 1922, he was admitted to the Oakland County Bar and began the practice of law in the office of James H. Lynch, where he was located until he accepted the appointment of first Assistant Prosecuting Attorney on January 1, 1925. On January 1, 1928, he resigned from the Prosecutor's Office and has since conducted a private practice in Pontiac.

Fraternally, Mr. Smith is a member of Delta Theta Phi law fraternity; of the Masonic Lodge No. 319 of South Lyon; a past commander of Pontiac Lodge No. 19 Knights of Pythias, and Pontiac Lodge No. 810 Elks. He was the first president of the Pontiac Junior Chamber of Commerce and is now a director of that organization.

He holds membership in the Pine Run Country Club; South Lyon Board of Commerce; Isaac Walton League of Oakland County; Oakland County Automobile Association and the Cook-Nelson Post American Legion.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Smith are members of the All Saints Episcopal Church and resides at 152 Washington Street, City of Pontiac.

Mr. Smith made the following statement: "I have entered this contest as a Republican who is not affiliated with the present political machine which I charge to be solely self-serving in its motives and neither Republican nor Democratic.

"In stating my views of the office, I would first recognize that it should be a law office and not a school for experience as pronounced in a certain philanthropic withdrawal published July 3, 1928, and that the appropriation for this office is sufficient to provide one assistant of matured age and experience as counsel for the public on public questions other than crimes.

"In the criminal work of the office, I believe that better results might be obtained if each member of the office were assigned to a certain branch of the work of the office and held responsible for the same. I further believe that it would be necessary to have two or three members of the Prosecutors office in Justice Court at the same time, if it were the policy of the office to prepare its case in advance.

"To commit myself on the ever important subject of the liquor law, I believe that the law should be enforced, and enforced in the same spirit as any other criminal law. I believe that the officers of the Sheriff's Department and Police Departments, are capable of obtaining evidence in liquor cases and that it is unbecoming for any member of the Prosecutors office to sally forth in the night time to raid private residences without a search warrant. Such conduct is not the result of an honest effort to enforce the law, and is a subject for serious inquiry. I further charge that favoritism is the worst enemy to respect for the law in general.

"In conclusion, I believe that the farther the Prosecutors office is removed from politics the better for all concerned and particularly the taxpayers of Oakland County."—Adv.
