Clarenceville Schools

To Open Tuesday, Sept. 4

The Clarenceville graded schools will open again on Tuesday, September 4 at 8:45 a. m. and 500 children will cease to be around home all day for another ten months.

The usual painting, cleaning and furnishing have taken place and the schools will show clean and bright when the kiddies get back. In addition, several changes have been accomplished, mainly at the Old School on Base Line road. The yard has been re-graded at the rear, the high school assembly room has been divided by folding "accordion" doors to care for the increased enrollment and provide another class room.

The foundation at the portable building has been made cold-proof, and the ceilings have been made horizontal, while the whole interior of the building has been painted. Increased comfort will be the result.

Junior high school: history and principal, Linna R. Herrington; seventh grade home room and arithmetic, Maurice Decoster; eighth grade home room and English, Helen M. Sarnes; ninth grade home room and English, Lucille Disenroth; tenth grade home room and science, Norman Fell. Music and art, Evelyn G. Heck; superintendent, A. A. Kaldor; school nurse, Lucille T. Dowsett.

The kindergarten will be served this year, as last year, by one teacher who will teach at the Central School forenoon and at the Edgewood afternoons.
