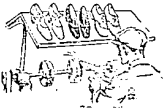


Banks Open On Primary Election Day, Sept. 4

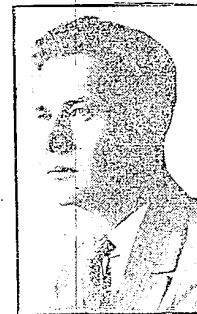

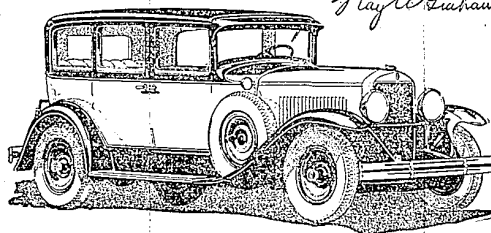
