

NEW HEARING ON
10-MILE ORDERED

ion that "it would be cheaper for the County to build the road than the City," and said he favored the improvement.

"New Bridge Needed"

City Commissioner Fred Staman declared that "the City soon must replace the bridge on McGee Hill anyhow," and the paving of Shawassaw street would cost nearly as much for city-type paving as for the heavier kind the County will put on." Commissioner Leo Gildemeister said that he believed "the people know my views, for I helped circulate the original petition."

Mayor Butterfield said he felt safe in saying that City Commissioners Bickling, Russell, and Johnson also favor the project, and would object to extending the Ten-Mile road straight west.

"I wouldn't want to see the road go straight west," declared Commissioner Staman. "And I certainly would object to it. It would cost nearly as much as this any way." Commissioner Staman said he told people the County would maintain the suggested road, and asked if he was right. He was told the County would maintain the road.

John Fitzpatrick, cashier of the Peoples State Bank, said he believed it was "a foolish statement" made at the hearing, "that the road would not be worth a nickel to Farmington." "Any paved road is valuable," said Mr. Fitzpatrick. "Mr. Hogle also asked me to tell the Commission for him today that he is thoroughly in favor of the road," continued Mr. Fitzpatrick. "And I am sure our organization favors it. We believe it should be built, and that

the City should pay its fair share."

"Benefit Greatest Number"

Charles Pettibone said he believed that "Commissioner Staman hit the crux, when he said the road should be built to benefit the greatest number of people." He said he was personally opposed to the road, because it would be a good idea to live. "I signed the petition against the road for that reason, but if it would benefit more people than going straight west, it is the duty of the officials to put it through this way," said Mr. Pettibone, whereupon Mayor Butterfield exclaimed, "You stand the same as I do. It won't hurt me personally or you, but your willingness to sacrifice your own personal feeling for the greater good, aren't you?" Mr. Pettibone responded, "Yes, if it is an overwhelming good."

"I wasn't born in Farmington," said Mayor Butterfield, "and there is a small group here who don't want a new man to come in. Many of the business men here are new. I should like to go out and start a campaign, and I believe if we would hire a man, we could get more names on a petition for this road than against it."

"Many who signed the petition against the road were led to believe it would cost more than this way," said F. Devere Fleming. "Every merchant in Farmington, if this road is not built, will lose more in lost profits than his tax would amount to. Then why not let it and pay the tax." "I drive to Pontiac about 50 times a year—driving to the Junction makes it two miles extra, at five cents a mile, which is more than a tax would be. Every argument against this road has been presented today by Mr. Pettibone, and he admits they are all from a selfish point of view."

Allen Favors Plan

Road Commissioner Luther Allen said, "I believe the road should be built on the right-of-way surveyed, and that thus far the Ten-Mile has been a poor investment for the Township. If I lived north of Farmington, I would not go to Farmington to trade. We are willing to invest more in this proposition than elsewhere. A hundred thousand dollars seems a lot, but with 2,000 descriptions, and when you divide up the people down there will be happily surprised, when the cost to each is shown. I believe Farmington City should grow as fast as Birmingham, with improvements. But I wouldn't want to force the road on anyone. We have enough to build anyway."

Supervisor McCracken cited the bad condition of the road in the valley and on McGee Hill, and said that if the Township had not spent anything on the Ten-Mile, I would not talk about this. But under the circumstances, he said, "It is unfair to us."

"Would not the territory north of Farmington develop much faster with this road?" asked Commissioner Allen, to which several replied that it would. Emory Hatton declared that even if no one in the City wanted the road, the Commission should build it for the benefit of the travelling public. "If the County were building this road, you wouldn't have to come over here to get it," responded Commissioner G. Ross Thompson.

"Almost any one can take out a petition and get it signed," said Supervisor McCracken, to which Commissioner Thompson replied, "We always listen to the people living on the road. We don't let a few stop an improvement."

Judge John J. Schulte said he believed in the logic of Mr. Hatton's analysis of the Ten-Mile as the only thorough road between the Seven and Twelve-Mile roads. "A woman came to me and said that they told her if this road is built, everything would be stopped on Grand River," he said. "I told her I didn't believe there was any basis for that. We want to see this road built."

"Five Dollars A Year"

Commissioner Allen suggested it might cost each taxpayer five

dollars a year, and added, "Five dollars a year don't seem much. Most of us spend that foolishly every week or two."

Engineer Belknap said in regard to the grade, "We are not going to dig down the top of the hill much, only from two to three feet. Also we are keeping the grade down—not over 100 feet of it will be six per cent grade or better. You'll be surprised at how flat the grade will be. It is flat above and below, with only about 100 feet of six per cent grade or better as the steepest part of the hill."

Commissioner Thompson said, "It will take a little time and expense, but we will make up our assessment rolls, and let each person see how much he personally will have to pay."

Mr. Belknap then said the rolls might be ready for a new hearing around October 1, and Commissioner Thompson said the rolls would be brought to the hearing. City Commissioner Staman declared that "the people in Farmington don't understand that they would have to pay for the road if it was put through straight west. It will be the same as this way. It will cost us who live near it almost the same, and wouldn't be worth very much to us, if anything."

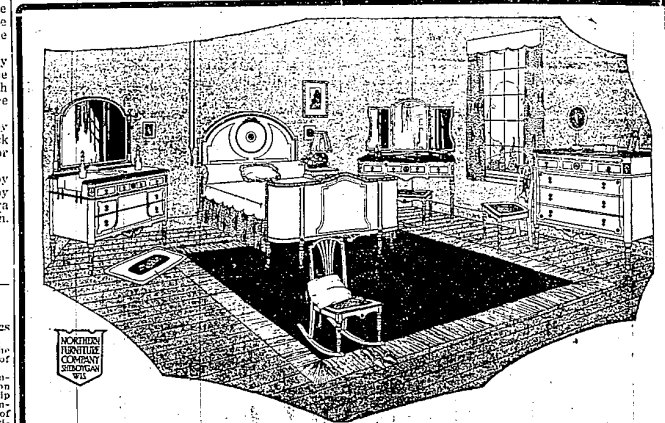
