POLITICAL ISSUES ARE DISCUSSED BY THE WOMANS CLUB

Parties and Platforms, Manner of Electing President, Are Subjects of Talks

The regular meeting of the Farmington Women's Club was held Wednesday, October 31, at the home of Mrs. R. G. Adams.

The program, "The Political Issue: Party Platforms, Qualifications for President; Manner of Electing a President," was in charge of Miss Meriah Andrews, Mrs. Charles Pettibone, and Mrs. Hibern.

No mere statement as to topics dealt with can give an adequate idea of the ability shown in selection, the skill in emphasis, and the thoroughness of preparation which these women brought to their work; the result was a most able treatment of a difficult and engrossing subject. Although her sympathies were elsewhere, Mrs. Hibern, in sportsmanlike fashion, gave a fair and adequate summary of the Democratic Platform, and the "personal platform" of its candidate.

Mrs. Pettibone gave a careful analysis of the Republican Platform, and an admirable exposition of its salient features; Miss Andrews explained the intricate method of operation, the evolution of the Electoral College, and the manner of electing a President, with clarity and directness.

The entire presentation was most timely and most valuable. A spirited discussion followed; in answer to roll call each member was asked to state in a sentence her reason for her choice of candidate. Many interesting replies were elicited.
