GENERAL ELECTION

To the qualified electors of the City of Farmington:

Notice is hereby given that a general election will be held in said City on Tuesday, November 6, 1928 at the Town Hall for the purpose of voting for the election of the following officers:

Presidential: Fifteen electors of President and Vice-President of the United States.

State: Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney-General, State Treasurer, Justice of the Supreme Court (to fill vacancy) for the term ending December 31, 1929, Justice of the Supreme Court (to fill vacancy) for the term ending December 31, 1935.

Congressional: United States Senator for the term beginning March 4, 1929, United States Senator (to fill vacancy) for unexpired term ending May 4, 1929, Representative in Congress for the Congressional District of which City forms a part.

Legislative: One Senator in the State Legislature for the Senatorial District of which said City forms a part, One Representative in the State Legislature for the Legislative District of which City forms a part, Circuit Judge to fill vacancy in the Sixth Judicial Circuit.

County: Judge of Probate, Prosecuting Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk, Register of Deeds, City and Court Commissioners, Drain Commissioner, Two Coroners and a County Surveyor as provided by Act 351, P. A. 1925, as amended.

Amendments to the City Charter:

I. RESOLVED: That the Charter of the City of Farmington as adopted on February 15, 1926 be revised as follows: Section 7 of Chapter 19 under Special Assessments which reads: "The cost and expense of any improvement which may be defrayed by special assessment shall include the cost of construction only, and in no case shall the whole amount levied upon any lot or premises for any one improvement exceed 25 per cent of the value of such lot or premises as valued and assessed for State and County taxation in the last preceding tax roll. Any cost exceeding the per cent which would otherwise be chargeable upon such lot or premises shall be paid from the general funds of the City," shall be eliminated in its entirety and the following paragraph shall be substituted therefore:

"Section 7 of Chapter 19". Such part of the expense of the improvement as the commission-ers shall determine, may be defrayed by special assessments upon lots and premises included in a special assessment district, to be constituted on the lands fronting upon that part of the street or alley so improved or proposed so to be or constituted of lands and such other lands as in the opinion of the Council may be benefited by the improvement.

II. Section 5, paragraph 3 of Chapter 5 under nominations. Which reads as follows: If after the nominations and determining the results it shall appear that there are less than two candidates for any office, it shall be the duty of the Commission to complete the ballot by adding such names as may be necessary, as hereinafter provided, so that when the ballot shall be placed before the electors there shall be not less than two candidates for each and every office to be voted on at such election (to be amended to read):

If after checking the nominations and determining the results it shall appear that there are less than two candidates for any office, the Commission may complete the ballot by adding names so that there may be two candidates for each office.

The polls of this election will be open at 7 o'clock a. m. and will remain open until 8 p. m. of said day of election.


