INTERNATIONAL GOLDEN RULE SUNDAY ON DEC. 2

International Golden Rule Sunday will be observed on December 2, 1928. "Whatever ye would that others should do unto you do ye even so unto them."

The immediate beneficiaries of International Golden Rule Sunday are the orphaned children of the Near East. Their parents were killed or died of persecution, deportation, exposure or starvation in connection with the various disasters of the late war. The children are practically all under sixteen years of age. All of them are too young to be thrown upon their own resources.

COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS

Commissioners present, Staman, Gildemeister, Hogle and Johnson.

Minutes of the meetings of November 5 and November 8 read and approved.

Communication from Fred Bueller and Frank Reuland asking for the privilege of establishing a jitney line from Farmington to the city limits was received. No action taken. Informal opinions expressed by some of the Commissioners was not favorable to the project.

Action of Police Commissioner Gildemeister in regard to the dismissal of Alfred Gagnon and the employment of Thomas Armstrong as police officer was approved.

Commissioner Gildemeister made a detailed report of the police situation and recommended certain changes in the officials.

Mayor Butterfield called Commissioner Hogle to the chair.

Motion made by Butterfield, supported by Gildemeister, that from this date on the City act independently in regard to its police force. Carried.

Motion made by Butterfield, supported by Johnson, that temporarily the Police Commissioner be considered the head of the police force. Yeas, Staman, Johnson, Butterfield and Hogle. Nays, Gildemeister. Carried. Mayor Butterfield took the chair.

Mr. Beckley, civil engineer from Detroit addressed the Commissioners in regard to paving, city plan, assessors plats, etc.

Moved by Johnson, seconded by Hogle, that Norman Barrons be appointed constable to fill vacancy. Carried.

Adjourned.
