Garner manages to be adorable; she turns in a poignant, intelligent performance as a woman who infally emerges into the light of day and is able to say soodbye to a dead man she should have said goodbye to 30 years before. Gene Eweld, as the philegmatic butcher Sam, keeps asking, "What field?" as he moves from one woman to another. Ewald moves about "the field" in his worker's cap and trenchoost, look-

ing the soul of ambivalence as he waltzes toward Ida, then waltzes away at a hint from her friends.

Ewald has a marvelous moment when Garner asks him what he thinks of her pendant; he leans into Garner's cleavage and asks, "What pendant?" Andrea Gleason does a handsome cameo as Mildred, a fourth woman Sam packs into his carload. She's obviously an "extra."

The pickings in Queens are rich. Sam invites tda to eat "kosher Chinese." The three women forgive each other anything and verything, and we believe them.
