OCC student reps link up with board

Oakland Community College administrators have embarked on a project to establish a link be-tween the student bodies at OCC's five disparate campuses with the saven-member board of

"I think it's a great idea," said OCC Chancellor Patsy Fulton. "After all, students are what OCC is all about, and one of the best ways to keep the college responsive to their needs is to have direct student participation in the college's governing authority, the board of trustees."

The project, begun by the board of trustees, took human form last month when five students were named representatives of their respective campuses. These five nascent facilitators were chosen from a group of 17 students who applied for the jobs. They are each expected to network with leaders of student groups on their respective campuses, then meet with each other every other week to decide what matters should be brought to the attention of the board of trustees.
