

Country Day wins 1-0 over Shamrocks

Redford Catholic Central star soccer player Rich Walos was asked if he knew a lot of Birmingham Country Day's players. "Too many," Walos said. "I know practically the whole team."

That was a bad sign for CC. Several of Country Day's players played alongside Walos during the spring and summer on the talent-rich Michigan Wolves Under-17 team. Six others from Country Day also played this summer on the Vardar III U-16 national champion team.

Country Day used its superior talent on Wednesday night to beat visiting CC, 1-0. The game might have turned into a rout were it not for the outstanding goalkeeping by CC senior Mike Kokoszka.

Country Day has won six straight small-class championships, including the last two in Class B. CC, unranked in Class A, is a 2-3 overall.

"We knew we were underdogs and had to play our hearts out," Walos said. "I don't think the ball got to the front much."

Country Day is 13-0 this fall with nine shutouts and hasn't lost since 1991 when Warren DeLaSalle won in overtime, 3-2. Livonia Stevenson, one of two teams to tie the Yellow Jackets last year, plays Friday, Oct. 8 at Country Day.

"Without a doubt, this is our best team talent-wise," Country Day coach Paul Bartoshuk said.

Country Day broke a scoreless tie with 25 minutes left in the second half with a goal by junior midfielder Dan Brody, assisted by junior midfielder Brandon Moggio. Brody earned some redemption since his hard shot from point-blank range was stopped minutes earlier by Kokoszka.

"It was scuffling in the middle, someone dropped the ball back and I had a shot at the far post," Brody said of his goal.

Brody set up teammate Tino Scieluna a couple minutes later but Scieluna's shot headed toward the upper right corner was knocked away by a diving KkKoszka. Scieluna, a 5-foot-6 135-pound senior midfielder from Redford Township, is the younger brother of former CC players Dominic and Mario Scieluna.

"Tino is hard nosed and loves to play with his back to the wall, where he needs to overachieve," Bartoshuk said. "He's the most intense player we have."

CC coach Phil LaJoy used junior defender Brian Collier to mark Country Day's leading scorer, senior forward Adam Hunter (11 goals). Walos, meanwhile, tried to shake senior defender Justin Marshall.

Walos and CC's leading scorer Jamie Heitert didn't threaten against Country Day goalkeeper Alan Placzek.

"We respect the heck out of Richie, he's the kind of player who if you give him the opportunity, he'll beat you," Bartoshuk said. "Rich and Marshall have been going at each other in practice (for the Wolves) probably six years and for them it was an intense intrasquad match. The key to our success was Justin dealing with Richie."

Country Day had two good scoring chances before halftime. The first one, Hunter failed to convert on a loose ball with Kokoszka out of the net; the second, Kokoszka dived to his left to deflect a shot by Jeremy Harkins off the goal post.

The Shamrocks on Tuesday shut out the University of Detroit-Jesuit 6-0 in a Catholic League Central Division game. Matt Kopmeyer and Jeff Buckley scored two goals each.

■ CANTON 62, HARRISON 44: Plymouth Canton led from start to finish Thursday and knocked the Hawks from the unbeaten ranks in WLAAs girls basketball.

The Chiefs, 8-1 overall and 3-0 in the league, used balanced scoring and near-flawless basketball to give host Harrison its first loss in three WLAAs games. The Hawks, who had a five-game winning streak snapped, are 6-3 overall.

"Canton played super," Harrison coach Pete Mantyla said. "They shot the ball well, passed the ball well and played defense well, too. They did a good job running their motion offense. When they weren't shooting the ball well, they

Area pro still going strong on tour

Just about the time Alesia Sill was ready to depart for a five-city stretch on the fall Ladies Professional Bowling Tour, I was able to get some of her views of the today's bowling scene.

Sill, a former resident of Westland and Garden City, is now living in Dearborn. She has been one of the top competitors on the LPBT for the past 13 years, has made more than 60 appearances on televised finals and is in second place in the all-time money wiring.

I asked her what her present goals are. She replied that she would like to stay on the pro tour as long as her physical condition will allow. The long, hard grind of being a professional bowler does take its toll. Tendons, ligaments, muscles and bones can stand only so much, and to keep sharp, a pro has to be in lots of practice in addition to the many games of competition.

For those bowlers who might want to try their skills on the tour, Sill has some good advice: "Don't expect the same lane conditions as you are used to bowling on in the local bowls."

They make the shot a lot tougher, and the quality of the competition is so good, that anyone who wishes to be in the top form and play the lanes just right. The greatest difference between a good league bowler and a pro is the ability to "reset to lanes" correctly and then play the shot accordingly. For those who are fortunate enough to make the TV finals, the task gets even more difficult as the lighting, the hushed audience and the emotional make-up create a different environment from what is normally used.

Sill will be on the road for several weeks with stops in Claymont, Del., Baltimore, Pittsburg, South Bend, Ind., and Rockford, Ill., followed by another long hike to Las Vegas for three tournaments over a two-week period at Sam's Town.

"I'm sure all of Sill's friends and former neighbors in Westland and Garden City wish her good luck. Sill offers a special tip for bowlers: "A big difference between bowlers and golfers is that if a golfer is having trouble he

or she will go to a pro and get some help. On the other hand, a struggling bowler will usually try to make their own corrections. It is just as tough to learn to bowl well as it is a good golfer, seek out a professional to help improve your game."

Of course, Sill is one of the very fine instructors in the area and in Satellite Bowl (Mondays through Fridays) when on the tour. Call the Bowler's Aid Pro Shop at Satellite to schedule an appointment with Sill.
