Anti-incinerator activist convicted of voter fraud

Irony? Or poetle justice?

An Oakland County woman convicted of making false statements while trying to vote is to be sentenced—on election day.

Marilynno Burton-Ristau Orion Township faces a maximum five years in prison after a circuit court jury Monday found her guilty of one charge of making a false affladwit to register to vote and a second charge of giving a

false statement on an absence ballot.

She is scheduled to be sentenced by Judge Richard D. Kuhn on Nov. 2, the same day dozens of Oakland County communities will conduct municipal elections. Burton-Ristau, a Canadian who has permanent resident status because she is married to an American, was found guilty in a three-day trial of twice filing statements for receiving absence ballots in 1990.

In the process of applying for the ballots, Burton-Ristau signed statements saying she was an American clitizen. She testified that she did so after an employee at the U.S. consulate in Toronto, Kenneth Shivers, advised her she was eligible to vote in local elections.
"It was a mistake," she said. "Had I known I couldn't vote, I would not have tried."
The prosecution contended Burton-Ristau violated voting

laws. The jury agreed.
"They jury obviously rejected the argument that it (the statements) was a mistake, said Gerald D. Poisson, chief assistant prosecutor. "Existing law clearly mandates that we prosecute violations of election laws and that's what we did.

"The purity of the election pro-cess must be preserved. It's the way we elect officials and decide issues of public policy."

Poisson said the prosecution will not ask for the maximum penalty. "It's up to the judge, but I don't think she'll even get jail time."

Burton-Ristau's supporters, in the meantime, insist the prosecu-tion against her was politically motivated.

"She stepped on some toes," said Thomas Strangway of Orion Township. "This whole thing was politics."

Burton-Ristau was president of RAIL (Residents against Inciner-ators and Landfills) and a vocal-critic of Oskland County's pro-posed \$500 million solid waste a program that included a \$200 mil-lion incinerator in Auburn Hills.

In 1991 Burton-Ristau was in the forefront of a highly controversial campaign as county officials sought voter approval on a bond issue to finance the solid waste program.
