Detectives depend on public's help

Police detective work is not much like what you see on TV. The branch of police work has become more and more special-ized and the case loads bigger

ized and the case loads bigger over the years.

"We depend on people in the business community to help us solve crime and stop crime," Nebus told a group of business people at a recent Crime Watch meeting.

Although police agencies have many sophisticated tools and methods for solving crimes, such as polygraph (lie detectors) machines, LEINs and other information networks, crime labs and computers, a case load of 50-60 cases per detective at any given time stretches resources of the department.

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That's where the public and business community can go a long way in helping prevent crime.

"We'll have a bad check come in where if someone would have

spont 8-10 seconds to nak for a driver's license and check the credit card there would not have been a problem," he said. "People will go on a three, four or five-thousand dollar shopping spree."

Nebus was preaching for the most part to the converted, business owners and managers who had gathered at Mr. Sports for breakfast for a business crime provention seminar.

Flu shots available at health department

The Oakland County Health Division will be offering flu and pneumonia shots from 1-3 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 12, at the Marian, Oakland-West, 29250 W. 10 Mile Road, Farmington Hills.


The flu vaccine is recommended for people over 65 years old or adults and children with chronic illnesses because they are at increased risk for complications of influenza. These high-risk persons are more likely than the general population to require hespieral population to require hospi-

talization if infected.
More than 40,000 unnecessary
deaths attributed to pneumonia
and several recent epidemics and
approximately 80-90 percent of
these deaths attributed to pneumonia and influenza were among
eepople 65 years of age or older.
Influenza vaccine is also strongly
recommended for household
members who may have close
contact high-risk persons.
This year's flu vaccine protects
against three viral strains: A/Tex-

as, A/Beijing, and B/Panam; the pneumosoccal vaccine protects against streptococcus pneumonia. Medicare covers the cost of the flu vaccine. Senior citizens are reminded to bring their Medicare cards to the flu clinic with them. For people who do not have Medicare, a minimal fee will be charged to those able to pay. In addition, both influenza and pneumonia immunizations will be available at the Health Division offices in Pontiac and South-

field, from Tuesday, Oct. 5-through the end of December. Than clinic hours are: Monday, noon to 7:30 p.m.; Tuesday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Farmington Hills officials learned a lot about handling dis-asters after completing a realistic disaster exercise Sept. 30.

The drill is a state requirement. But unlike other years, the city made it more realistic, said Hills assistant city manager David Call.

"This one was very realistic,"
Call said. "It gave us a more accurate time frame for when things happen and how they unfold in a disaster."

Call said in many previous drills, city administrators would simulate disasters only on paper. With an actual physical drill in

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
