Entry fee per player is \$75.

"We're not after football players, this is just another option," Rose said. "A lot of people are happy to have an alternative to a sportless fall. As a die-hard baseball fan, it's right up my alley, it's a great chance for some of the younger kids to play against older high school competition and get accilimated to high school ball."
