Hills mulls its policy on notifying residents about developments

Residents' protests of a request to qualify a large store as a "planned unit development" have Farmington Hills rethinking its Farmington Hills rethinking its policy of publicizing such propos-

planned unit development I may be policy of publicizing such proposals.

More then 100 residents had come to a planning commission meeting in August after hearing about a proposal to build a SourceClub store on property at 12 Mile and Middlebelt. Many were angry that they only heard of the proposal by word-of-mouth or in the Observer.

Although council members agreed that the requirement of a sign on the site of a proposed development would help, automatically informing all residents in a given area would be costly in terms of mailing.

Debra Kendzierski, vice president of the council of homeowners, told council members that the current ordinance — requiring notification of residents within 300 feet of a proposed development of a public hearing on it—was not enough.

"That might only include one or two residences in our area," she

said.

The council is considering informing subdivision association presidents within a one-mile radius of a proposed development when it goes before the planning commission for the first time, rather than later in the process. In other action at its Oct. 11 meeting, the Hills council:

Introduced an ordinance to regulate cable TV rates.

Introduced an ordinance to put a tax lien on property when residents do not pay fines for false alarms.

allarms.

Approved a reward system to encourage reporting vandalism at city parks.

Heard about recruitment offorts by the fire department. Of more than 60 applicants, the department has 25 paid-on-call fire fighters. Four will be assigned to Station 1, nine to Station 2, three to Station 3 and nine to Station 4, said Fire Chief Richard Marinucci.


