Zoo attendance, income up

Nearly half the one million visi-tors to the Detroit Zoo paid an ad-ditional \$2.50 to walk through Di-nosauria, which featured more than 20 life-sixed, prehistoric creatures. The Detroit Zoo is ap-proaching business from a whole new perspective.

Since January, some 489,000 visited Dinosauria, which 200 officials call "super popular." These figures add up to a 40-percent increase in zoo attendance and a gross total of \$1.7 million

from Dinosauria alone.

The zoo, on Woodward at I-696 in Royal Oak, plus Dotroit's Belle Isle Zoo and Aquarium, which attracted 200,000, drew more than 1.2 million visitors. That makes the Detroit Zoological Parks one of Michigan's top five tourism attractions in 1993.

"The success of Dinosauria means a new way of doing business at the zoo," said Chuck Hammond, executive director of the Detroit Zeological Society, the private fund-raising arm of the

city of Detroit-owned zoo.

"It proves that creative, market-driven entrepreneurship can leverage new resources and support. The knowledge we gained this year will serve as a bedrock for future, large-scale projects."

Hammond reported a 20-percent increase in DZS membeships, now totaling 23,000.

"Through Dinosauria, the Detroit Zoological Society netted \$550,000, of which \$200,000 will be used to help establish the zoo's first endowment fund," he said.


Ward Bower, a principal of Alt-man Weil Pensa, Inc. will explore "the New Legal Economics" of the 1990s, its ramifications for
