Zietz sparks North victory, 28-21 over Livonia Franklin

Senior quarterback David Zietz passed for 156 yards and two touchdowns Saturday to lead North Farmington to its second football victory.

Zietz completed 11 of 22 passes as the host Raiders (2-6) defeated Livonia Franklin 28-21.

Senior tight end Scot Lord caught six passes for 107 yards, including a 27-yard touchdown reception. Zietz also passed 53 yards to Richard Beal for another TP.

"If he can throw the ball, we have kids who can catch it," North coach Jim O'Leary soid, adding the Raiders have a limited rushing attack. "He has to be able to throw it or we're not going anywhere."
