Dr, J. F. Rumer Not Asked to Vote for Ascher's Pardon by Ex-Gov. Warner

In an interview with Dr. L. F. Rumer, who is a member of, the advisory board of pardons and paroles, by the appointment of ex-Gov. Warner, vesterday afternoon, in regard, to his action on the board in the case of Ed Ascher, and the demand of Gov. Osborn to his resignation from the board, the doctor had the following to say:

"Gov. Warner never asked me

to vote in favor of his granting a pardon to Ed Ascher.

"He requested me to lock over the files in the case and go over the testimony, which I did very carefully, and then went to Detroit with the governor and saw the six jurymen. They told me of the confinement for 36 hours in a jury room whose floor was covered with the contents of an overflowed with

mony and talked with the six jury-men, I would not have thought of advising elemency in this case But after I heard their story and saw a recard of the different ballotwhich stood 6 to 6, and one 7 for acquittal to 5 for conviction. I

changed my mind.
"Then an ex-prosecuting attorney of Wayne county also told me in his office in Detroit that it was an infernal outrage to convict and sentence a man for life on such testimony. "This case had been tried once before, and the jury stood 6 for acquittal and 6 for conviction, which shows that the testimony

was none too strong.
