Residents wary of development plan

'Although a plan to build a re-gional retail store near a Farming-ton Hills residential aren is dead, some area residents are still not

some rare residents are as dead, some area residents are still not resting easy. Developer Gary Jonna had originally wanted to qualify a proposed SourceClub warchouse store and housing project as a planned unit development, but withdrew the offer before planning commissioners could consider it in August.

More than 100 residents, most of them living near the 90-plus acre lot on the southwest corner of Middlebelt and 12 Mile, attended to protest. Jonna withdrew it from

the agenda and instead, is bring-ing a more modest commercial de-velopment for consideration by the commission Nov. 18. "The SourceClub is dead at that location," said planning commission chairman Paul Bliz-

commission chairman Paul Bliz-man.
But Ann Harris, one of the many residents opposed to the SourceClub plan, said she is not sure what Jonna is really plan-ning this go around.
Harris said she and some oth-ers who originally opposed the SourceClub have met with Jonna to hear about his new proposal. But the proposal has been changed so that Harris isn't sure what the developer really has

planned.
"Another day, another story," she said. "It's just upsetting to me that he's changed his proposal."

Jonna said he will be proposing a development that includes a neighborhood shopping center with a housing development, not a regional shopping facility, such as the SourceClub. Jonna added that his request will not depend on the "cluster housing option," or especially dense housing, to make it go.

Jonna will take his project be-fore the planning commission for a public hearing on Nov. 18 at 7:30 p.m.
