Two employees said a male wearing a bandanna made away with \$100 in cash and a gold necklace in an armed robbery at Little Caesars on Grand River in Farmington Nov. 7. He took cash from the register and placed it into a pouch. He led both employees back to the refrigerator area before leaving. They described the man as black between 5-feet-11 and 6-foot-2 and weighing 135 pounds. Both em-
