**FOOD ALLERGY**

Adverse reactions to foods and food additives are common problems, which occur in less than 10% of the United States population. In order to evaluate possible food allergies in any given individual and accurate record of all food, beverages, drugs, physical contact with other allergens, activity and symptoms would be very important. Systematic elimination of potential food allergens combined with diary food can be a powerful diagnostic tool. All suspected foods are eliminated for at least one or two weeks then reintroduced one by one at two day intervals. Skin testing with food extracts is the most widely used procedure for evaluating food allergies. Modern technology provided further allergy testing (blood test) which may contribute to establish the correct diagnosis. Once the diagnosis is clearly made strict avoidance of the offending food will constitute the only way of treatment and prevention.
