

Mercy ends regular season with rout of Mumford

Despite being outscored Friday, Farmington Hills Mercy ended the regular season with a 50-34 win over visiting Detroit Mumford in girls basketball.

Junior Julie Angell scored 16 points, which included eight of nine free throws, to lead Mercy (8-12). Sophomore Liz Weber added 11 points and Junior Felicia Brooks eight.

Junior guard Glenda Lee had 11 assists Thursday in 61-36 win over Bishop Foley and nine more on Friday.

Laney Wade scored 10 points for Mumford (9-9), which trailed 20-15 at halftime and 34-23 after three quarters.

"I thought we turned in our best performance of the season Thursday," Mercy coach Larry Baker said. "Within 24 hours, while we weren't sharp and we were outscored 40-28, we did play aggressively and forced

Mumford into 40 turnovers."

Of the last five Mercy opponents, only one had scored more than 40 points. Bishop Burgess had 42.

"We've held everyone else down in the 30s," Baker said, "and that's a pattern I like seeing regardless of the win-loss situation at the end of the season."

"We're playing the best defense I've seen us play in about three

years. Defensively, we're (entering district play) with the best attitude since the season started."

Angell scored 20 points and Brooks 12 Thursday against Foley (14-6). The Marlins led 35-21 at halftime and outscored the Ventures 26-15 in the second half.

"We've played some good ball the last three weeks," Baker said. "I was delighted with this game. We really stepped up our defense.

The victory over Divine Child at the end of the season gave us a lot of confidence."

■ HARRISON 42, FRANKLIN 26: Krista Snow (16 points) and Carey Perkins (nine points) carried the scoring load Thursday for Farmington Harrison (13-12) against host Livonia Franklin (8-12).

Mary Bagatzinski scored six

points and grabbed nine rebounds in the Patriots, who couldn't overcome a 20-8 halftime deficit.

"We had a good defensive effort," Harrison coach Pete Mantyla said. The Hawks led 20-8 at halftime. "It's a good way to go into the districts."

■ FARMINGTON 46, JOHN GLENN 37: Junior guard Andrea Salyer scored 16 points Thursday, lifting

the visiting Falcons (6-14) to the win against Westland John Glenn (3-13).

Freshman guard Amanda Porter contributed 13 points for the Falcons.

Farmington made 17 of 28 from the free-throw line for 61 percent. Glenn, 11 of 21 from the stripe (52 percent), got 14 points from Kelly Klene and 11 from Rachelle Harris.

along with Britta. Shannon McCoy and Carrie May had eight points apiece for North, and Allison Stein added six.

The Raiders began the game in a zone instead of their usual man-to-man defense, but Britta Anderson was still able to maneuver inside. She scored Canton's first 10 points and 12 of her 14 first-half points in the opening quarter.

Canton pressed full court and forced the Raiders into 10 first-quarter turnovers. Erica Anderson added six points, and the Chiefs led 19-10.

"North Farmington has been playing very well lately, and we had to step out and get them off balance real quick," Britta Anderson said. "We knew they were going to play zone, and we knew there would be an open lane in the middle. That's how we got a lot of our shots."

"(The Raiders) defended the post player-to-player," Blohm said. "She was the second cutter, found the opening in there and was able to take the ball to the rim."

North turned the tables on Canton in the second quarter, throwing its full-court press at the Chiefs instead of waiting until the second half.

"I thought we did an excellent job, but their size wore us down. Canton has good ball handlers and rebounders, and we had to pick and choose when we pressed. Rebounding won the game for them more than anything, not so much breaking the press but second rebounds."

The Raiders stayed close early in the third. Baskets by Gordon and McCoy kept North within 33-32, but Canton made its move at that point.

"In the third quarter, we picked up our intensity and rebounded real well," Blohm said. "They switched defenses a lot tonight, and we handled that better and dealt with the press better in the second half. Nounie started taking the ball and bringing it, and I like that."

"I thought Amicie (Crayton) had a good game defensively and a good rebounding third quarter. She was a real key because she put pressure on McCoy, who is a real quality player."

■ SALEM 53, WESTERN 35: Plymouth Salem gained the early advantage Friday and rolled over Walled Lake Western in the consolation game at Canton.

The Rocks (12-9) led 11-2 in the first quarter and 27-11 at halftime. They extended the lead to 43-17 after three periods.

Salem's Lisa Craven scored 11 points, including three triples, and Liz Erickson had 10 points and 13 rebounds. Andrea Ramsay added nine points, Jenny Mansey and Karen Gundry six apiece.

Angle Bickel scored a game-high 14 points for Western (8-12). Stacey Neirynck had 11 and Liz Beale six.

"We were really solid tonight, offensively and defensively," Salem coach Fred Thomann said. "We shot the ball well from the perimeter."

"Coming back after a loss (to Canton in the WLAA semis) is a difficult situation.
