Solid waste expert works up a storm

BYRALPH R. ECHTINAW STAFF WRITER Roger Smith is your typical worksholic; well-recommended, competent, doesn't sprint to the parking lot at quitting time and occasionally sleeps overnight in the office.

competent, doesn't sprint to the parking lot at quitting time and occasionally sleeps overnight in the office.

Smith, who serves Oakland County tarpayers as solid waste management director, admits to working 60-66 hours in a typical week. Last Monday he didn't leave work until 9 p.m. or so, then drove 30 some miles home to Livonia and hurried back to Pontiac the first thing in the morning. Southfield Mayor Don Fracassi said Smith was the same way when he worked for the city. "He really would not pay attention to five o'clock," Fracassi said. Smith's former secretary in Southfield, Chris Weinhaus, said the boss once spent the night bundled up in a sleeping bag in the office because a heavy snowfoll was predicted overnight. "He kept me real busy and real challenged," Weinhaus said. "I enjoyed working for him thoroughly. He's a good man."

In Oakland County government, Smith, 55, is the realdent solid waste expert. His job is to see that the county complies with all state and federal regulations regarding disposal and recycling of garbage. "What it all boils down to is, "Where are you going to bury it?" "he said.

It used to be that they talked about trash incinerators for Oakland County, and that's how Smith came to be effered his current job.

As public services director for Southfield city government in the Inte 1980s, Smith vigorously opposed a county solid waste plan that called for way more inclurator capacity than the county could possibly use.

"At the south end, we were saying, Wait a minutel The whole waste stream ien't that big. You don't need to build that kind of inclineator capacity," "Smith remembers.

As it happened, said Jim Bren-nan, a county commission staff member, Smith so impressed county officials with his opposi-tion to their plan that they offered him a job assembling an alternate plan.

tion to their plan that they offers thin a job assembling an alternate plan. "(Smith) had not only a handle on what should be done, but some of the best data banks I've ever seen," Brennan said. "You name it, he had the information or knew how to put it together." Former county commission chairman Roy Rewold, working with then-County Executive Dan Murphy, hired Smith in 1989. "I was never sorry we were able to get him from Southfield," Rewold ald. "He's a great men. He works 24 hours a day. He'd be there (in the office) on Saturdays and Sundays even."

Fracassi was sorry to see Smith leave Southfield. "When he left tog to the county, it was hard to Lake," the mayor said. "He's a very, very well-qualified individual."

Smith had spent 18 years working for Southfield in several different jobs. His original specialty was traffic engineering, a field he



His Astro van, modified to serve as a mobile fly fishing head-quarters, just takes him to and from work for now. He hasn't built and flown a wire guided model sirplane in years, but still maintains his membership in the American Modelers Association and reads the magazines.
