Soccer crew seeks kids for contests

The Michigan Host Committee for next year's World Cup soccer matches in Oakland County is trying to recruit students and schools for several programs and contests leading up to the games.

Although their sign fell off the wall at an Oakland University press conference, committee members and staff hope to involve hundreds of kids and dozens of schools in the programs and contests.

All of the hoople will lead up to the World Cup matches in the Pontiac Silverdome June 18-28. Six teams are expected to pley first-round playoff games here. One of the teams will be the United States. The others will be determined in a Dec. 19 Las Vegas drawing. Given the popularity of soccer around the world it's expected that Southeast Michigan will be deluged with foreign visitors during the games.

Committee member Sandra Packard, the president of OU, hopes that having five foreign soccer teams and their fans visiting Michigan will make the world community seem more real to area kids.

"An event like this in their own backyards really brings that home," she said. "It will encourage young people to gain a better understanding of the world."

Committee president Roger Faulkner, a Rochester Hills realdent and native of Great Britain, said that hosting World Cup matches is nearly a once-in-a-lifetime event. It would take at least 30 years to get the games back, he said.
