
The Hawks were 11-2 and won the Western Lakes Activities Association and Class A state champlonships.

Junior Andrew Dzyngel was be-hind Premier at 130 and will hat-tle sophomore Jeff Gutierrez for the starting spot this year. One of the two will move up to 136 if Lesperance doesn't make that weight.


