

1. Bronze Tiffany-Style Frank Lloyd Wright Prarie Collection Lamps



3.Geometric-Shaped Deck Prism Paperweight



Egypt used the same concept to light its interior. Prism \$27.50. Lighted base (not shown) \$19.95.




4. Limited Edition Pewabic Tile

Pewabic Pottery was founded in 1903 in Detroit by Mary Chase Perry Stratton, who attracted commissions for mosaic and tile works from the leading architects of the period. Pewabic art pottery is represented in both the DIA and Washington, D.C. Freer Gallery collections. Tile colors are yellow, blue and terra cotta. 
