■ PRESCHOOL ACTIVITIES
A variety of activities for preschool children will be offered at the Day Camp Center in Heritage Park beginning the week of Jan.

■ CHILI GOLF OPEN
If you love golf, you'll love this event. A nine-hole golf tournament will be Saturday, Jan. 29, at the San Marino Golf course. A shotgun starting format will be used beginning at 10 a.m. After completing a round of play, participants can enjoy chili and a hot dog. Fee is \$15 per person with a

registration deadline of Jan. 24. Awards based on registration.

■ AFTER-SCHOOL RECREATION
Dance, art, music, tumbling and karate have been planned for children ages 6 to 13 at various school sites, Day Camp Center and Mercy Center. Registration is now being accepted at the recreation office for the classes that will begin the week of Jan. 10.

■ SWIM LESSONS
Beginning Jan. 8 there will be a five-session swim lesson program at the Mercy Center pool. Classes

from beginning preschool through advanced youth are available at various times Monday through Saturday. Pre-registration is now being accepted at the recreation office. Fee is \$25 per person.

■ KINDERMUSIK OF FARMINGTON HILLS
Norma Atwood, a certified Kindermusik instructor, will introduce parent and child to a specialized program that will nurture the musical growth and development of the child. Classes will begin the week of Jan. 17 and run

for 14 weeks. Classes have been scheduled for children ages 1½-6. Fee ranges from \$60 to \$84, depending on the child's age, plus a \$30 class fee.

■ CRIBBAGE TOURNAMENT
We're looking for players for the Recreation Division's first cribbage tournament on from 7-10 p.m. Friday, Jan. 21. A maximum of 32 players will be registered. The format will be "round robin" to determine the champion. Refreshments will be provided. Fee is \$6 per person.

Hills man gets White House internship

Farmington Hills' John V. Berry, a graduating senior majoring in political science at the University of Michigan-Dearborn, has been selected as an intern at the White House, starting in January. Last summer, another UM-Dearborn political science student and recent graduate, William B. Anaya, served as an intern with Thomas F. McLarty III, White House chief of staff.

"The selection of John Berry and Bill Anaya says that UM-Dearborn is doing something right in its political internship program," said political science Professor Helen M. Graves, director of the political internship program.

Berry has participated in two UM-Dearborn political internships with former U.S. Rep. Dennis Hertel and Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Richard Hathaway. He also worked as a law clerk in the Detroit Criminal Division of the state attorney general's office.

Graves and Hertel sponsored Berry's application for the White House internship. At UM-Dearborn, Berry was a student government representative, member of Tau Kappa Epsilon International fraternity and member of Young Democrats. He made the dean's list three consecutive terms, winter 1992 through winter 1993.

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
