Committee members did agree to leave open the question of whether a proposed arena should be privately or publicly owned and run. Several committee members, including Lindhardt and Sever, said they had initially only been interested in a privately owned and operated arena, but now see it as something that could be publicly run without draining the city budget.

of the Parks and Recreation Commission, settled for the compromise of leaving the private option
intact, but not without a protest.

"Why should we do the work and then offer it to somebody else

to make money on?" he said.

A mission statement and final changes to the report will be made and given to committee members before it in presented to the council, most likely at the Jan. 24 regular meeting, Lichtman said.

Lichtman said he also plans to push for a study session with council and committee members before the final recommendation is given to the council.

Timing is critical because interest rates are low and if the council can make a recommendation to go forward, a balled question to go forward, a balled question seeking public approval to build an arean could be on the August primary ballot. Although public approval would not be required for the city to use revenue bonds to finance an arean, the council has already said it would put any such question before the voters.


