Rocks eventually built that to a 13-8
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

It didn't make a difference in the victory, Salem reassumed its dominant mode in the fourth game, with newcomer Kelly Johnston — a junior transfer from Livonia Ladywood—serving the final eight points in a 15-4 triumph that gave the Rocks a three-games-to-one Western Lakes Activities Association victory.
Harrison had been the choice to win the WLAA prior to the season. No more. It was the Hawks' second-
