LTU partnership program wins award for innovation

Ignited by a mother's concern about her young daughter's science education, Lawrence Technological University's Partnership for Science Literacy was named one of eight programs nationwide to win a Merck Innovation Award in Science Teaching and a portion of the \$200,000 in grants.

Lawrence Tech's partnership program was cited by Merck because it "provides workshops for Detroit area elementary and middle-school teachers to increase their knowledge of physics concepts and develop their skills in teaching physics through hands-on activities."

Maria Vaz, director of natural sciences at Lawrence Tech, has seen the partnership program through its first five years and said this national recognition is a happy milestone for the partnership.

"I think this is a measure of our success," said Vaz, a resident of West Bloomfield.

The key to the workshops,

which attract more than 60 teachers from throughout the metropolitan Detroit area every year, is offering practical, hands-on exercises using inexpensive equipment that can be used in the classroom by third- to eighth-grade teachers.

The workshops touch on various scientific disciplines and principles, and provide help for teachers who feel overwhelmed in trying to make science interesting to their students.

"The problem is not that physics and chemistry are ill-suited to certain students or age groups, but that teachers themselves felt unprepared and unable to teach physical sciences creatively, in a way that connects with these students," Vaz said.

This year the Society of Automotive Engineers has joined the partnership as a sponsor and will introduce portions of its popular World in Motion program. The partnership was opened to private and parochial schools last year.

Women and minority students at Lawrence Tech also are a vital

part of the partnership team. They visit the schools to wow elementary and middle school students with scientific demonstrations. The Lawrence Tech students are fulfilling one of the most important components of the partnership, Vaz said.

"They are role models who give the school children a little extra attention and motivation," Vaz said. "The Lawrence Tech students get a lot out of doing the demonstrations. They enjoy it because the children interact with them so well."

The partnership program, which is also funded by a Higher Education Competitive Grant from the Dwight D. Eisenhower Mathematics and Science Education Act, is staffed by Marilyn Rands, associate professor of physics and a resident of Rochester; Scott Schneider, assistant professor of physics and a resident of Farmington Hills; and Ronald Livingston, of the Barbour Magnet Middle School in Detroit.


